Trail Descriptions

Locke Trail

Starting at Marsh Road (Gate 2), this trail follows the western boundary for ~1 mile before it enters private land. Locke Trail

connects the trails throughout the southern half of the forest and reaches the Merry Hill Trailhead via South Trail.

Ledges Loop This short loop connects the Locke Trail to the Overlook Trail and leads to the top of the beautiful cliffs overlooking Stonehouse Pond.

Please stay on the trail to minimize impact to sensitive forest soils.

Overlook Trail This trail connects the northernmost portion of the Locke Trail to the east end of Ledges Leap before reconnecting with the Locke Trail further south.

O Brook Trail

This trail leads from private land, overlaps briefly with the Locke Trail, and then continues to a wildlife viewing spot overlooking a shrubby wetland.

South Trail

This trail extends from the Merry Hill Trailhead to Marsh Road, connecting the northern and southern parts of the north trail system.

Marsh Road This unmaintained dirt road extends from Rte. 9 to Merry Hill Road and connects trails on the north and south portions of the forest. Marsh Road Bypass detours a beaver pond.

Marison Trail

This trail is an old woods road that begins at the Marison Trailhead at Rte. 202, and passes through two clearings on its way to Marsh Rd. The first clearing, at the intersection of the Marison and Bog Trails, features a stone stairway to nowhere. The second features foundation remnants from the Marison farm. Marison Trail East and West both connect to Marsh Road.

Bog Trail

This trail leads to nice views of Round and Little Round Pond and meets up with Marison Trail East before intersecting with Marsh Road.

Boulder Trail

This trail provides access to the swimming boulder via the Locke Trail and Overlook Trail. The swimming boulder should not be access via the pond frontage at the end of Stonehouse Pond Road, as this area is managed by NH Fish and Game for fly-fishing and car-top boating only.
