

A Gift that Lasts Forever

In 2020, the Collins family generously donated 500 acres of scenic wonder, water and wildlife protection, public hiking trails, and one of the best views around.

The Collins Family Forest is a rich, diverse woodland that stretches from the shore of Merrymeeting Lake to encompass Mount Molly and extends all the way to the trailhead at Devil's Den. With almost the entire Collins Family Forest located within the Merrymeeting Lake watershed, the forest serves as a natural filtration system, helping maintain Merrymeeting's status as one of the cleanest lakes in New Hampshire.

The Collins Family Forest includes the slopes and peak of Mount Molly. Follow the trails to the top of Mount Molly and take in a showstopper of a view of Merrymeeting Lake and Birch Ridge Community Forest with the Blue Hills Range in the distance.

Thank you to the Collins family for their extraordinary gift and to members of the community for the outpouring of support and donations to make the Collins Family Forest a reality.

Trail Descriptions

- O Devil's Den Direct (White) 0.7 miles Moderate

 This trail allows hikers to access the Devil's Den trailhead without hiking up the Class IV roads. Leaving from the Valley Way, the trail descends to cross a stream and then climbs the opposite side of the valley to the height of land and out to the road. Moderate slope in both directions.
 - Mount Bet Trail (Red) 1.8 miles Moderate
 Leaving from the Marsh Hill Road parking area, briefly follow an old
 logging road to the newly built hiking trail. The trail follows a moderate climbing line up and over the mountain with a short spur near the
 summit to a view point overlooking the western end of Merrymeeting
 Lake. The north end of the trail rejoins the old logging road and runs out
 to Chesley Road.

Enjoy the Trails!

Mt. Molly Trail (Blue) 1.42 miles - Moderate

A moderate climb from either direction, the Mt. Molly trail follows a wide foot path from North Shore Road to the summit and an old logging road from the summit down to Devil's Den Road. The summit provides great views of Merrymeeting Lake, Birch Ridge Community Forest, and points to the south and west.

Homestead Trail (Red) 0.9 miles - Moderate

An old logging road that runs east to west across the property, this trail connects Chesley Road to North Shore Road. A moderate climb from North Shore Road connects you to the Mt. Molly Trail or allows you to cross on easy grades to the sweet fern field near Chesley Road. Near the junction with Chesley Road, you can find several old cellar holes from the Miles Chesley Family settlement.

Owl's Head (Green) 0.75 miles - Moderate

Leaving from the height of North Shore Road, this ridgeline trail brings you to the middle of the valley east of Mt. Molly. A moderate climb from either direction, a pleasant hike through young beech forest and older hemlocks.

Valley Way (Orange) 0.83 miles - Easy

Following the valley east of Mt. Molly, this trail provides a nice loop option for a summit hike. Mostly an old logging road, with a section of newly constructed trail, this is an easy walk or ride.

Collins Path (Purple) 0.35 miles - Easy

Newly constructed trail takes you from the parking lot to the Chesley Connector, where the trail turns to an old logging road to take you up to the Homestead Trail. An easy walk or ride- can be part of a short loop hike on Chesley road or connect you to the larger trail network!

Chesley Connector (Yellow) 0.25 miles - Easy

An old logging road that connects to the lower end of Chesley Road, a great way to create a short loop or stay off of North Shore Road while accessing the trail network.

Chesley Road and Devil's Den Road (Class VI)

While SELT owns property on both sides of these roads, they are town roads and we do not maintain them. Please use caution while traveling on these roads- they are open to vehicle traffic including cars, ATV/UTVs, and motorbikes.

North Shore Road

Many of our trails connect to North Shore Road, but please use caution if traveling on this road. This road is narrow, winding, and heavily trafficked including construction vehicles.




